Monday January 27 - The Quiet American by Graham Greene

While the French are battling the insurgent Viet Minh in Indochina (now Vietnam), in Saigon, a young American becomes involved in a war he cannot win.

Monday February 24 – *The Left Hand of Darkness* by Ursula LeGuin Genly Ai is sent to the planet Winter to make contact with its people and finds himself drawn into their world.

Monday March 17 – Blue Nights by Joan Didion

In this meditative memoir, well-known writer Didion reflects on her adoptive daughter's life, her own parenting shortcomings and on aging.

The actress and food writer reminisces about growing up in a large well-to-do Delhi family. Recipes are included.

Monday August 18 - The Master and Margarita by Mikhail Bulgakov

Now considered a classic of 20th century Russian Fiction, Bulgakov's inventive novel about the devil's visit to 1930s Moscow was suppressed during Stalin's regime.

Monday September 15 – The March by E. L. Doctorow

Near the end of the Civil War, General William Tecumseh Sherman marched 60,000 Union soldiers through Georgia and the Carolinas, leaving a path of destruction that comes to life through the eyes of real and fictional characters.

Monday October 20 - Dear Life by Alice Munro

A collection of intertwined short stories set in small-town Ontario by Alice Munro, winner of the 2013 Nobel Prize in Literature for being "master of the contemporary short story."

Monday November 17 – The Hare with Amber Eyes by Edmund De Waal

In a moving memoir of one wealthy Jewish family and a precious set of netsuke figurines, the author traces the history of anti-Semitism and the Jews' terrible losses during the first half of the twentieth century.

Monday December 15 - Cleopatra: A Life by Stacy Schiff

Schiff dispels the myth of Cleopatra's alluring beauty and instead portrays the shrewd, calculating politician she surely was in an engaging story filled with accurate, immersive period details.
